// Course OVERVIEWS

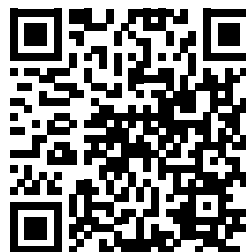
Stage 1 | 40 Miles Friday, July 29th

Course Description

Get ready to meet St. Kevins! Within 4 miles of the Stage 1 start, you will conquer the first of two big climbs of the course. St. Kevins will test your legs with steep rocky sections that seem to never end. After the Carter Summit Aid Station (fluids only) at Mile 10 you can enjoy a short break on pavement around beautiful Turquoise Lake. Next, you will head up Hagerman Pass to Sugarloaf Pass for a brief introduction to the high alpine tree line at 11,161 feet. Keep your wits because hiding just over the south side of Sugar loaf Pass is the infamous Power line section. “Loose, steep, fast and exciting,” doesn’t even come close to describing these 2 miles of jaw-dropping fun. Once down, enjoy the only flat paved section on the course. Make good time as you pace line around Fish Hatchery to the Pipeline Aid Station at Mile 28.

Reload for the Pipeline Road and don’t forget there is some sweet singletrack waiting at the end! Cross over the Twin Lakes Dam to reach the Stage 1 finish. A truck located at the Lake County Rodeo Grounds will be available to transport drop bag items from the start line to the Twin Lakes Dam.

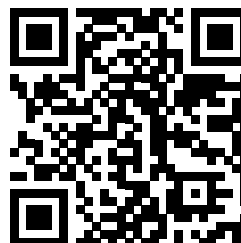
Stage 2 | 22 Miles Saturday, July 30th

Course Description

Elevator going up! At the sound of the gun, you have 8 miles of pure climbing that will bring you to the top of the Columbine climb and the Columbine Aid Station at mile 11. Check out the views from 12,513 feet as you swing into the aid station, but don't stay too long. You still have 8 miles of white knuckled descending! Please be sure and stay to the right as you cross paths with EVERY-ONE in the race. Give a shout to those still climbing! Twin Lakes Dam - Intersection of Highway 82 and County Road 25

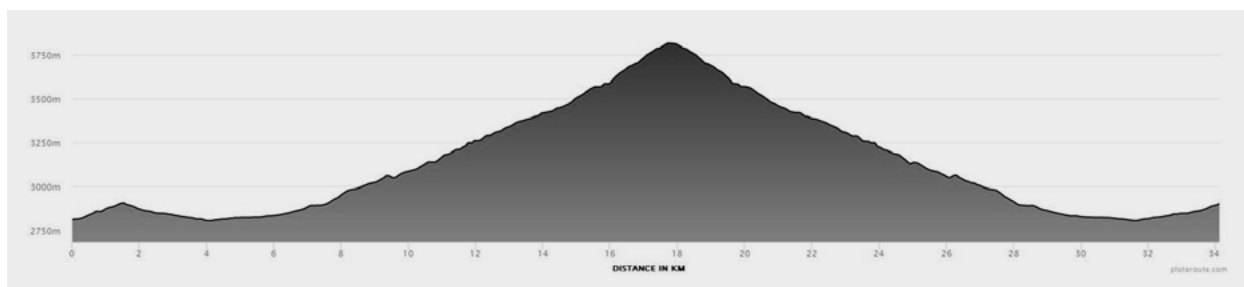
Athletes can leave their bikes at the Twin Lakes Dam after Day 2 finish. Overnight security will be provided.

Stage 3 | 41 Miles **Sunday, July 31st**

Course Description

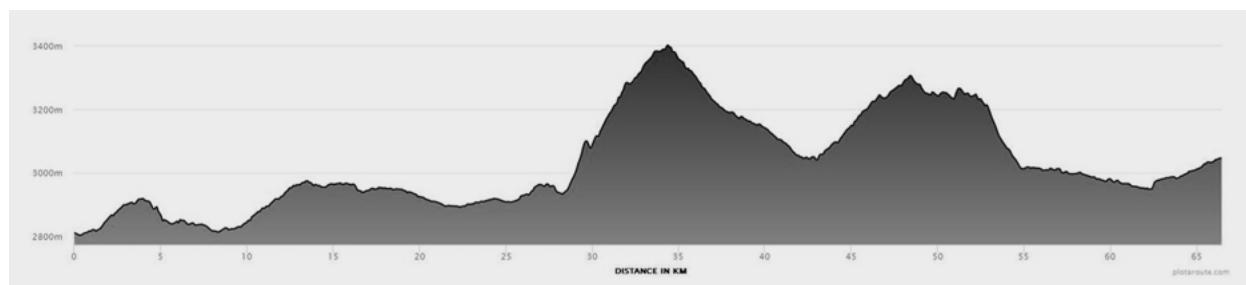
It's time to retrace your steps, literally, as you make your way back to the Pipeline Aid Station, at mile 11.5, and prepare for your trek up and over the Power line climb. As you descend Hagerman Pass, be ready for one last big effort on the paved road around Turquoise Lake. Coming through Carter Summit Aid Station at Mile 30 means you are almost home. A truck will be available at the Twin Lakes Dam to deliver drop bag items to the finish at the Lake County Rodeo Grounds.

// Aid STATIONS

There will be well-stocked aid stations during each stage of the race. Aid stations will offer water, Gu products (Roctane, gels, waffles), and an assortment of foods including bananas, figs, pretzels, chips.

// Crew & Spectator INFORMATION

It's great to see you! Crews and spectators are treated and appreciated equally with the participants and are included in the Leadville Race Series family.

Crew Do's:

- Pets are welcome, but must be leashed and under control at all times
- Crews are welcome at Pipeline and Twin Lakes Aid Stations
- Allow adequate time drive safely to aid stations, to park and to walk to aid stations.
- Riders are responsible for the actions of their crews.

Crew Don'ts:

- Vehicles are not allowed on any dirt road sections of the course.
- Please do not park on any vegetation at any time or block driveways or intersections
- There will be no crewing or access at the base of Powerline
- This includes where Powerline meets the pavement

In an effort to protect private lands and community relationships, it's important to be aware our race courses cross multiple Private Property Sections including, but not limited to the following areas: Powerline, Sugar Loaf Mountain, and the Columbine climb. Please join us in decreasing overall impact and increasing awareness and regard.

What you need to know with regard to showing up in Leadville.

From Race Director, Tamira Jenlink:

We welcome you Leadville race family, and are so excited to have you here and share this amazing back yard with you! You are the sustenance and foundation of all of our events. And unmistakably, your love for this community and these events, creates a life and energy much like that of a family reunion. (or for some of us... maybe the one we dream of...)

Along those lines and true to our ideal of what family means, so many of you have, and continue to reach out and ask “What can I do?” “How can I support, volunteer or be more a part of this amazing community?” And this season, I want to take a few moments to answer you directly, and equally as important, share a little of what our community of Leadville has also requested.

// **Transportation** INFORMATION

Stage 1

the Stages Cycling Leadville Stage Race starts at the Lake County Rodeo Grounds, which has plenty of parking available. The Stage 1 finish is located 20 miles south of Leadville at Twin Lakes Dam.

Stage 2

begins and ends at the same location, Twin Lakes Dam. Athletes are responsible for their own transportation out to Twin Lakes Dam for Stage 2. Parking area is marked on this map.

Stage 3

begins at Twin Lakes Dam and finishes at the Lake County Rodeo Grounds.

Shuttle Service is available from Twin Lakes Dam back to the Lake County Rodeo Grounds on Day 1 and from the Lake County Rodeo Grounds out to Twin Lakes Dam on Day 3. The optional two-day shuttle cost is \$10 and can be purchased during registration.

Note: No Bikes are allowed on the shuttles, overnight security is provided.

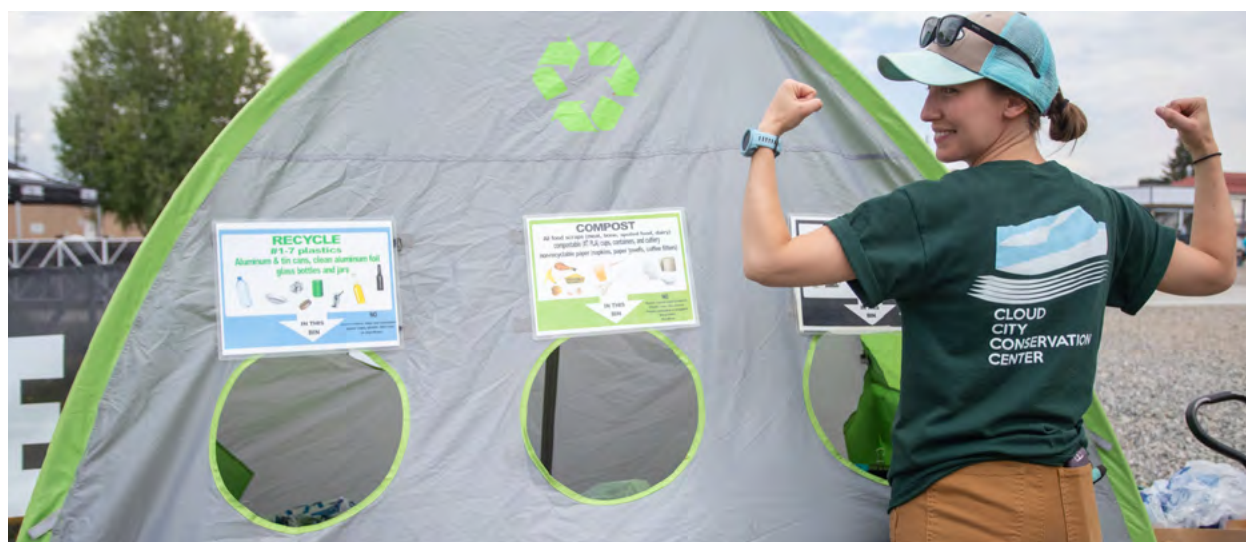
// Zero Waste & LEAVE NO TRACE

Zero Waste

All LRS events are under a zero waste initiative, and as such will be enforcing strict guidelines around waste and sustainability at our events. What does this mean? These events have the potential to leave an enormous footprint. Part of our responsibility to this community and all public and private lands involved in these events, is our stewardship and protection of this land. **WE MUST HAVE YOUR HELP!**

Trash & Recycling

- We partner with our local zero waste non-profit, [Cloud City Conservation Center \(C4\)](#), to divert 100% of race day waste from our local landfill. All Leadville races are a Zero Waste Event - meaning we do our absolute best to reduce, reuse, recycle and compost before sending something to the landfill.
- In 2022, Leadville managed to collect 68lbs of wrappers with GU TerraCycle! GU Energy is a proud partner once again and looks forward to repeating this successful impact in 2023 .
- **Know Before You Throw** - Leadville is a small community and we do not have the same waste infrastructure as your community. Please read all signage before tossing your trash -including both event and public receptacles. Aren't sure where to toss it? Ask a Zero Waste Volunteer on site or visit [C4leadville.org](#) before your trip to plan ahead.
- As a **Leave No Trace (LNT)** event, racers and crew are required to abide by the LNT principles on race day. We encourage you to follow these principles during your entire visit to Leadville - throughout your race weekend and any training visits you make as well! Please see our page on LNT.
- Intentional littering on the course, will be grounds for disqualification.
- The course—on trails both public and private— travels past many historic sites and through areas of exceptional beauty. Join us in this crucial initiative to keep them pristine!



// Zero Waste & LEAVE NO TRACE CONTINUED

Leave No Trace

The Leave No Trace Seven Principles

① Plan Ahead and Prepare

- Know the regulations and special concerns for the area you'll visit.
- Prepare for extreme weather, hazards, and emergencies.
- Schedule your trip to avoid times of high use.
- Visit in small groups when possible. Consider splitting larger groups into smaller groups.
- Repackage food to minimize waste.
- Use a map and compass to eliminate the use of marking paint, rock cairns or flagging.

② Travel and Camp on Durable Surfaces

- Durable surfaces include established trails and campsites, rock, gravel, dry grasses or snow.
- Protect riparian areas by camping at least 200 feet from lakes and streams.
- Good campsites are found, not made. Altering a site is not necessary.

In popular areas:

- Concentrate use on existing trails and campsites.
- Walk single file in the middle of the trail, even when wet or muddy.
- Keep campsites small. Focus activity in areas where vegetation is absent.

In pristine areas:

- Disperse use to prevent the creation of campsites and trails.
- Avoid places where impacts are just beginning.



// Zero Waste & LEAVE NO TRACE CONTINUED

③ Dispose of Waste Properly

- Pack it in, pack it out. Inspect your campsite and rest areas for trash or spilled foods. Pack out all trash, leftover food and litter.
- Deposit solid human waste in catholes dug 6 to 8 inches deep, at least 200 feet from water, camp and trails. Cover and disguise the cathole when finished.
- Pack out toilet paper and hygiene products.
- To wash yourself or your dishes, carry water 200 feet away from streams or lakes and use small amounts of biodegradable soap. Scatter strained dishwater.

④ Leave What You Find

- Preserve the past: examine, but do not touch cultural or historic structures and artifacts.
- Leave rocks, plants and other natural objects as you find them.
- Avoid introducing or transporting non-native species.
- Do not build structures, furniture, or dig trenches.



⑤ Minimize Campfire Impacts

- Campfires can cause lasting impacts to the backcountry. Use a lightweight stove for cooking and enjoy a candle lantern for light.
- Where fires are permitted, use established fire rings, fire pans, or mound fires.
- Keep fires small. Only use sticks from the ground that can be broken by hand.
- Burn all wood and coals to ash, put out campfires completely, then scatter cool ashes.
- KNOW AND FOLLOW ALL CURRENT FIRE RESTRICTIONS

⑥ Respect Wildlife

- Observe wildlife from a distance. Do not follow or approach them.
- Never feed animals. Feeding wildlife damages their health, alters natural behaviors, and exposes them to predators and other dangers.
- Protect wildlife and your food by storing rations and trash securely.
- Control pets at all times, or leave them at home.
- Avoid wildlife during sensitive times: mating, nesting, raising young, or winter.

⑦ Be Considerate of Other Visitors

- Respect other visitors and protect the quality of their experience.
- Be courteous. Yield to other users on the trail.
- Step to the downhill side of the trail when encountering pack stock.
- Take breaks and camp away from trails and other visitors.
- Let nature's sounds prevail. Avoid loud voices and noises.

// Your Safety & Health WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Medical Aid Stations are run by LCSAR and staffed by a combination of LCSAR members and non-member volunteers.

All Medical Aid Stations have basic first aid and basic life support capability, and provide:

- Wound and blister care
- Hemorrhage Control
- Orthopedic and athletic injury stabilization
- OTX analgesic medications
- Hypothermia and Hyperthermia care
- Medical assessment
- BLS life support and resuscitation
- Oxygen and IV therapy only to critical patients while awaiting the next level of care (ambulance or flights)
- All medical aid stations can communicate with Race Command and Race Medical Command to request or transfer of the patient to the next level of care.

On-Course Emergency Response

- On-course emergency response is organized and run by LCSAR and staffed exclusively by LCSAR members.
- On-course rescuers will respond on ATV's, in marked vehicles with lights and sirens, and sometimes on mountain bikes or on foot. Please give way to all rescue personnel you encounter on course!
- If you experience an emergency, or witness an emergency on course, please call 911, if able, and include a bib number and as specific a location as possible in your report. If you are not able to make a call, report your emergency or have a fellow competitor report your emergency to the nearest on-course LCSAR personnel or aid station personnel.

Please always remember this is an open/public course and you will encounter traffic on county roads. Stay aware of traffic at all times and remember that safety is priority number one.

Course Marking

Course is PUBLIC and open to vehicles! State Hwy 82 will have law enforcement and all other major intersections will be staffed by volunteers/staff and/or adequately marked!

Bike Shipping

Cycles of Life is a full-service bike shop right in the town of Leadville, providing shipping services, all types of minor and major repair, tune-ups, custom wheel building, suspension and fork overhauls, bike fitting and more. To make things easy for you, have your bike shipped directly to the shop where Cycles of Life will unpack, assemble, inspect, fully tune and prepare your bike for race day. Post-race, simply drop off your ride and Cycles of Life will repack and ship to your destination.

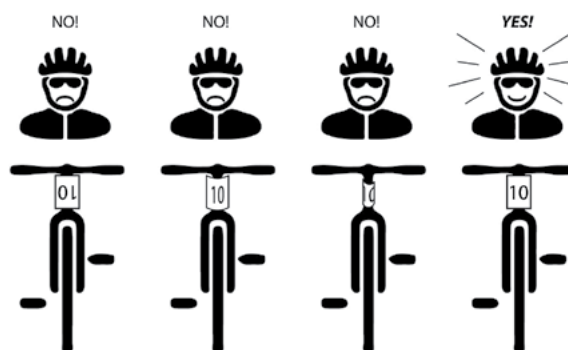

Race Numbers must be visible at all times, tied to the handle bars of your bike. Please do not cut or fold your number. The timing chip is affixed to the number. If you cut or fold your race number you may damage the chip, which means your race times will not be recorded.

All athletes who finish the Stages Cycling Leadville Stage Race in under 11 hours will receive a custom branded leather belt and a finisher buckle.

// Awards & LT100 QUALIFIER INFO CONTINUED

LT100 Qualifier

The 2023 Stages Cycling Leadville Stage Race will award 70 qualifying slots to the Stages Cycling Leadville Trail 100 MTB.

Half of the qualifying spots will be allocated based on the top age-group performances and half will be drawn among riders who have finished the qualifier race within the allocated cut-off time of 11 hours.

The 2023 Stage Race will award 70 qualifying slots to the Leadville Trail 100 MTB.

- There will be at least 1 slot allocated to each age group with a racer in that age group.
- All remaining slots will be distributed through the drawing concluding the Stage Race awards and Age Group Awards.
- All finishers under the pre-determined maximum finish time, who have indicated their desire to participate in the drawing, will be entered.
- Names will be drawn from the eligible athletes and slots will be given out.
- In the event an athlete opts not to accept a slot, the slots will roll down to the next athlete that is drawn, until ALL slots have been distributed.
- Qualification slots must be claimed in person immediately.
- Registration for the Leadville Trail 100 MTB must be completed and paid for within the designated timeframe.
- All athletes must decide if they will be using the slot for the 2023 or 2024 LT100 MTB at the time of accepting the coin.
- All athletes that accept the coin/ slot for the 2024 LT100 MTB will receive a card/ paper upon accepting the coin at awards and will use the unique QR code/ link to Run Signup to register and pay for the 2024 Stages Cycling Leadville Trail 100 MTB. Deadline to register is AUGUST 2nd, 2023!
- All athletes that accept the coin/ slot for the 2024 LT100 MTB will receive a card/ paper upon accepting the coin at awards and will use the unique QR code/ link to Chronotrack and a code to register and pay for the 2024 Stages Cycling Leadville Trail 100 MTB. Deadline to register is AUGUST 2nd, 2023!
- All registration fees for the LT100 are non-transferrable and non-refundable.
